

#### Monday July 5, 2021

If anyone loves Me, . . . We will come to him and make Our home with him. —

#### John 14:23

### Today's Scripture: Psalm 139:1-12

Have you ever been alone—really alone?

Many people can answer yes because they feel that way every day. I'm not referring to people who live in a remote cabin on a mountaintop far from civilization. I'm talking about those who feel alone in a crowded mall, or in a church full of people.

I'm referring to people who simply cannot find anyone to connect with. Perhaps they are new to a community. Maybe they have lost a spouse. It could be that they simply feel alone because they think of themselves as different, unusual, and left out of normal communication with others.

Have you ever been alone, really alone? If so, there's good news. If you have invited Christ into your life as Savior and Lord, you're never alone. You have His constant presence. Here is His promise: "I am with you always, even to the end of

the age" (Matthew 28:20). And from God the Father: "I will never leave you nor forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5). Recognize with the psalmist that there's no place you can go where God is not with you (Psalm 139:7).

Sure, we all need flesh-and-blood companions, but let's not overlook the reality of the Lord's presence. We can depend on it. With Him by our side, we're never alone.

Be content with such things as you have. For He Himself has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." —

#### Hebrews 13:5

#### **Today's Scripture:**

#### **Hebrews 13:1-6**

From time to time, lonely people call me to share their problems. One man, who professes faith in Christ, is struggling to live a pure life. Whenever he falls into sin, he needs reassurance of God's forgiveness.

Another person who calls is a woman who has had some bad experiences with men. She has to be assured that God still loves her.

Then there's a young woman with a physical disability. She lives alone because she is treated badly at home.

All these people have two things in common: they've felt the pain of rejection, and they are lonely. But it's loneliness that stands out as their greatest problem.

Loneliness can't be cured just by being with people, seeing a counselor, or talking on the phone. What's needed is friendship. That's where we who are not lonely can help. We must befriend lonely people.

Just waiting for someone to become a friend, however, is not the way to find the cure for loneliness. Hebrews 13:1-6 does not mention this problem, but it does give the answer. We must focus our attention on Jesus Christ. He promises to be a helper who will never leave nor forsake us (vv.5-6).

Jesus always listens and always cares. He will help you make it through any situation.

#### Psalm 139:3

## Today's Scripture: Psalm 139:7-18

In today's world of inexpensive, high-tech spying devices, total privacy has become a rare and precious thing. A special agent for the Georgia Bureau of Investigation says, "Don't assume that you are alone, not ever."

Cameras are used to monitor people in public places like banks and shopping malls. In addition, tiny wireless video cameras that sell for less than \$100 are being used by ordinary people for less than honorable purposes.

It might seem odd, therefore, to hear someone celebrate a complete lack of privacy, until we realize that the One watching his every move was Almighty God. After stating that God knew each thought, word, and action before it happened, David said, "Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is high, I cannot attain it" (Psalm 139:6).

No place was beyond the presence, guidance, and protection of God (vv.7-10). The deepest darkness became flooded with light because God was there (vv.11-12). From the womb to the tomb, every day of David's life was known to his Creator (vv.13-16).

And the number of times God thought about him could not be counted (vv.17-18).

We are completely known and never alone in our relationship with God. What a comfort! —DCM

#### **Today's Scripture:**

#### Hebrews 13:5-6

Robinson Crusoe, the chief character in a novel by Daniel Defoe, was shipwrecked and stranded on an uninhabited island. Life was hard, but he found hope and comfort when he turned to the Word of God.

Crusoe said, "One morning, being very sad, I opened the Bible upon these words, 'I will never, never leave thee, nor forsake thee.' Immediately it occurred that these words were to *me*; why else should they be directed in such a manner, just at the moment when I was mourning over my condition, as one forsaken of God and man?

"'Well then,' said I, 'if God does not forsake me, . . . what matters it, though the world should all forsake me . . . ?' From this moment I began to conclude in my mind that it was possible for me to be more happy in this forsaken, solitary condition than it was probable that I should ever have been in any other state in the world; and with this thought I was going to give thanks to God for bringing me to this place."

Have you been forsaken by a friend, a child, a spouse? God has said, "I will *never* leave you nor forsake you" (<u>Hebrews 13:5</u>). So you too can say with confidence, "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear. What can man do to me?" (v.6).

John 16:25-33

Her brief note to me spoke volumes. "I am a handicapped person in a wheelchair," she wrote. "I am very lonely even though I know I'm never alone. God is always there. I don't have a lot of people to talk to."

Loneliness has been termed the most desolate word in the English language. It is no respecter of age, race, economic status, or intelligence. Albert Einstein said, "It is strange to be known so universally, and yet to be so lonely."

God made us for intimacy and companionship with others. Even before sin entered the world, He declared that it is not good for man to be alone (Genesis 2:18). That's why many people often feel so empty inside.

Jesus knew loneliness too. He surely must have felt it when His disciples deserted Him (<u>Mark 14:50</u>). The Father's presence more than compensated for this, however. He said, "I am not alone, because

#### **Today's Scripture & Insight:**

Isaiah 43:14-21

New beginnings are possible. Just ask Brayan, a young man who joined a gang in elementary school. Brayan ran away when he was 12 years old, and for 3 years was lost in gang and drug life. Although he left the gang and returned home, it was difficult for him, as he had been expelled from school for selling drugs. When he enrolled in a new high school, however, a teacher inspired and encouraged him to write about his experiences rather than repeat them. He embraced the challenge and is now experiencing a fresh start.

God, through the prophet Isaiah, encouraged

Jewish exiles to think about a new beginning as
well. God said, "Do not remember the former
things, nor consider the things of old" (Isa. 43:18).

He told them to stop dwelling on their punishment
and even on His display of power through the
original exodus from Egypt. He wanted their

attention to be focused on God who would give them a new beginning by bringing them home from Babylon through a new exodus (v.19).

With God, new beginnings are possible in our hearts. He can help us to let go of the past and start clinging to Him. Relationship with Him provides a new hope for all who will trust Him.

#### **Quiet Times**

Be still, and know that I am God. —
Psalm 46:10

**Today's Scripture:** 

Psalm 23:1-3; Mark 6:30-32

My friend Mary told me that she had always valued the time she spent fishing with her dad. Not being a fishing aficionado myself, I was curious about what she found so enjoyable. "I just like being with my dad," she said. "So you just fish and talk?" I asked her. "Oh, no, we don't really talk," she said. "We just fish."

It wasn't the conversation—it was the company.

Did you ever think about how much time we spend talking? In what we like to call our "quiet time" with God, we usually fill in any silence with our prayers. But do we ever practice just being "still"?

God said, "Be still, and know that I am God" (Ps. 46:10). When Jesus noticed that the disciples were so busy that they didn't even have time to eat, He told them, "Come aside by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while" (Mark 6:31). When we leave the distractions of life behind, we can more easily rest and refocus on God.

Are you allowing quiet moments alone with God to be a part of your life? Do you desire for Him to restore your soul? (Ps. 23:1-3). Let Him teach you how to "be still." And listen when Jesus invites you: "Come aside with Me and rest a while."

#### **Quiet Time With God**

#### Wednesday July 14, 2021

He makes me to lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside the still waters. —

#### Psalm 23:2

#### **Today's Scripture:**

#### Psalm 23

The word *connected* captures our contemporary experience of life. Many people rarely go anywhere without a cell phone, iPod, laptop, or pager. We have become accessible 24 hours a day. Some psychologists see this craving to stay connected as an addiction. Yet a growing number of people are deliberately limiting their use of technology. Being a "tech-no" is their way of preserving times of quiet, while limiting the flow of information into their lives.

Many followers of Christ find that a daily time of Bible reading and prayer is essential in their walk of faith. This "quiet time" is a disconnection from external distractions in order to connect with God. The "green pastures" and "still waters" of <a href="Psalm">Psalm</a>
23:2 are more than an idyllic country scene. They speak of our communion with God whereby He restores our souls and leads us in His paths (v.3).

All of us can make time to meet with God, but do we? In Robert Foster's booklet "7 Minutes With God," he suggests a way to begin: Start with a brief prayer for guidance, then read the Bible for a few

minutes, and close with a short time of prayer that includes adoration, confession, thanksgiving, and supplication for others. It's vital to take time today to connect with the Lord, who is our life.

#### **Something New**

#### Thursday July 15, 2021

See, I am doing a new thing! . . . I am making . . . streams in the wasteland.

Isaiah 43:19

#### **Today's Scripture & Insight:**

Isaiah 43:14-21

Farming is difficult in areas that lack fresh water. To help solve this problem, the Seawater Greenhouse company has created something new: "cooling houses" in Somaliland, Africa, and other countries with similar climates. Cooling houses use solar pumps to drizzle saltwater over walls made of corrugated cardboard. As the water moves down each panel, it leaves its salt behind. Much of the remaining fresh water evaporates inside the structure, which becomes a humid place where fruit and vegetable crops can flourish.

Through the prophet Isaiah, God promised to do a "new thing" as He provided "streams in the wasteland" for ancient Israel (Isaiah 43:19). This new thing contrasted with the old thing He had done to rescue His people from the Egyptian army. Remember the Red Sea account? God wanted His people to recall the past but not let it overshadow His current involvement in their lives (v. 18). He said, "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness" (v. 19).

While *looking* to the past can bolster our faith in God's provision, *living* in the past can blind us to all the fresh work of God's Spirit today. We can ask God to show us how He's currently moving—helping, remaking, and sustaining His people. May this awareness prompt us to partner with Him to meet the needs of others, both near and far.

#### **Running and Rest**

Friday July 16, 2021

[Jesus] said to them, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest."

#### Mark 6:31

#### **Today's Scripture:**

#### Mark 6:30-46

The headline caught my eye: "Rest Days Important for Runners." In Tommy Manning's article, the former member of the U.S. Mountain Running Team emphasized a principle that dedicated athletes sometimes ignore—the body needs time to rest and rebuild after exercise. "Physiologically, the adaptations that occur as a result of training only happen during rest," Manning wrote. "This means rest is as important as workouts."

The same is true in our walk of faith and service. Regular times of rest are essential to avoid burnout and discouragement. Jesus sought spiritual balance during His life on Earth, even in the face of great demands. When His disciples returned from a strenuous time of teaching and healing others, "He said to them, 'Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest'" (Mark 6:31). But a large crowd followed them, so Jesus taught them and fed them with only five loaves and two fish (vv. 32–44). When everyone was gone, Jesus "went up on a mountainside to pray" (v. 46).

If our lives are defined by work, then what we do becomes less and less effective. Jesus invites us to regularly join Him in a quiet place to pray and get some rest.

#### **Today's Scripture & Insight:**

#### **Ephesians 3:14–21**

What are the five best toys of all time? Jonathan H. Liu suggested the following: A stick, a box, string, a cardboard tube, and dirt (GeekDad column at wired.com). All are readily available, versatile, appropriate for all ages, fit every budget, and are powered by imagination. No batteries required.

Imagination plays a powerful role in our lives, so it's not unusual that the apostle Paul mentioned it in his prayer for the followers of Jesus in Ephesus (Eph. 3:14–21). After asking God to strengthen them with His power through His Spirit (v. 16), Paul prayed that they would be able to grasp and experience the full dimension of the love of Christ (vv. 17–19). In closing, Paul gave glory to "him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us" (v. 20).

Often our experience limits our prayers—a situation we can't picture being different; destructive habits that remain unbroken; long-held attitudes that seem to defy change. As time passes,

we may begin to feel that some things cannot be changed. But Paul says that is not true.

By God's mighty power working in us, He is able to do far more than we may dare to ask or even dream of.

#### **Today's Scripture & Insight:**

#### **Ephesians 3:14–21**

Some years after the tragic loss of their first spouses, Robbie and Sabrina fell in love, married, and combined their two families. They built a new home and named it *Havilah* (a Hebrew word meaning "writhing in pain" and "to bring forth"). It signifies the making of something beautiful through pain. The couple says they didn't build the home to forget their past but "to bring life from the ashes, to celebrate hope." For them, "it is a place of belonging, a place to celebrate life and where we all cling to the promise of a future."

That's a beautiful picture of our life in Jesus. He pulls our lives from the ashes and becomes for us a place of belonging. When we receive Him, He makes His home in our hearts (Ephesians 3:17). God adopts us into His family through Jesus so that we belong to Him (1:5–6). Although we'll go through painful times, He can use even those to bring good purposes in our lives.

Daily we have opportunity to grow in our understanding of God as we enjoy His love and celebrate what He's given us. In Him, there's a

fullness to life that we couldn't have without Him (3:19). And we have the promise that this relationship will last forever. Jesus is our place of belonging, our reason to celebrate life, and our hope now and forever.

#### **Today's Scripture & Insight:**

#### **Ephesians 3:14–21**

Sometimes the words of children can jolt us into a deeper understanding of God's truth. One evening when my daughter was young, I told her about one of the great mysteries of the Christian faith—that God through His Son and Spirit dwells in His children. As I tucked her into bed, I said that Jesus was with her and in her. "He's in my tummy?" she asked. "Well, you haven't swallowed Him," I replied. "But He's right there with you."

My daughter's literal translation of Jesus being "in her tummy" made me stop and consider how when I asked Jesus to be my Savior, He came and took residence within me.

The apostle Paul referred to this mystery when he prayed that the Holy Spirit would strengthen the believers in Ephesus so that Christ would "dwell in [their] hearts through faith" (Ephesians 3:17). With Jesus living within, they could grasp how deeply He loved them. Fueled by this love, they would mature in their faith and love others with humility and

gentleness while speaking the truth in love (4:2, 25).

Jesus dwelling inside His followers means that His love never leaves those who've welcomed Him into their lives. His love that surpasses knowledge (3:19) roots us to Him, helping us to understand how deeply He loves us.

Words written for children can say it best: "Yes, Jesus loves me!"

**Today's Scripture & Insight:** 

Genesis 9:12-17

On a hike in the mountains, Adrian found himself above some low-lying clouds. With the sun behind him, Adrian looked down and saw not only his shadow but also a brilliant display known as a Brocken spectre. This phenomenon resembles a rainbow halo, encircling the shadow of the person. It occurs when the sunlight reflects back off the clouds below. Adrian described it as a "magical" moment, one that delighted him immensely.

We can imagine how similarly stunning seeing the first rainbow must have been for Noah. More than just a delight to his eyes, the refracted light and resulting colors came with a promise from God.

After a devastating flood, God assured Noah, and all the "living creatures" who've lived since, that "never again [would] the waters become a flood to destroy all life" (Genesis 9:15).

Our earth still experiences floods and other frightening weather that results in tragic loss, but the rainbow is a promise that God will never judge the earth again with a worldwide flood. This

promise of His faithfulness can remind us that though we individually will experience personal losses and physical death on this earth—whether by disease, natural disaster, wrongdoing, or advancing age—God bolsters us with His love and presence throughout the difficulties we face. Sunlight reflecting colors through water is a reminder of His faithfulness to fill the earth with those who bear His image and reflect His glory to others.

Fishing Where They Ain't

One of the Pharisees asked [Jesus] to eat with him. And He went to the Pharisee's house, and sat down to eat. —

Luke 7:36

**Today's Scripture:** 

Luke 7:34-48

I have a good friend I fish with now and then. He's a very thoughtful man. After climbing into his waders and boots and gathering up his gear, he sits on the tailgate of his truck and scans the river for 15 minutes or more, looking for rising fish. "No use fishing where they ain't," he says. This makes me think of another question: "Do I fish for souls where they ain't?"

It was said of Jesus that He was "a friend of tax collectors and sinners" (Luke 7:34). As Christians, we are to be unlike the world in our behavior, but squarely in it as He was. So we have to ask ourselves: Do I, like Jesus, have friends who are sinners? If I have only Christian friends, I may be fishing for souls "where they ain't."

Being with nonbelievers is the first step in "fishing."

Then comes love—a heart-kindness that sees

beneath the surface of their off-hand remarks and

listens for the deeper cry of the soul. It asks, "Can

you tell me more about that?" and follows up with compassion. "There is much preaching in this friendliness," pastor George Herbert (1593–1633) said.

Such love is not a natural instinct. It comes solely from God. And so we pray: "Lord, when I am with nonbelievers today, may I become aware of the cheerless voice, the weary countenance, or the downcast eyes that I, in my natural self-preoccupation, could easily overlook. May I have a love that springs from and is rooted in Your love. May I listen to others, show Your compassion, and speak Your truth today."

#### Ephesians 4:13

#### **Today's Scripture & Insight:**

#### **Ephesians 4:11–16**

A recent survey asked respondents to identify the age at which they believed they became adults. Those who considered themselves adults pointed to specific behaviors as evidence of their status. Having a budget and buying a house topped the list as being marks of "adulting." Other adult activities ranged from cooking dinner every weeknight and scheduling one's own medical appointments, to the more humorous ability to choose to eat snacks for dinner or being excited to stay at home on a Saturday evening instead of going out.

The Bible says we should press on toward spiritual maturity as well. Paul wrote to the church at Ephesus, urging the people to "become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ" (Ephesians 4:13). While we're "young" in our faith, we're vulnerable to "every wind of teaching" (v. 14), which often results in division among us. Instead, as we mature in our understanding of the truth, we function as a unified body under "him who is the head, that is, Christ" (v. 15).

God gave us His Spirit to help us grow into a full understanding of who He is (John 14:26), and He equips pastors and teachers to instruct and lead us toward maturity in our faith (Ephesians 4:11–12). Just as certain characteristics are evidence of physical maturity, our unity as His body is evidence of our spiritual growth.

May we see each person as Jesus did: made in God's image and worthy of His love. Let's treat everyone we meet with Christlike equality and learn to see beauty as He does.

Because of the Japanese emphasis on good quality, products with slight defects are often discarded. However, in recent years wakeari products have gained popularity. Wakeari means "there is a reason" in Japanese. These products are not thrown away but are sold at a cheap price "for a reason"—for example, a crack in a rice cracker.

My friend who lives in Japan tells me that *wakeari* is also a catchphrase for people who are obviously less than perfect.

Jesus loves all people—including the *wakeari* who society casts aside. When a woman who had lived a sinful life learned that Jesus was eating at a Pharisee's house, she went there and knelt behind Jesus at His feet, weeping (<u>Luke 7:37–38</u>). The Pharisee labeled her "a sinner" (v. 39), but Jesus

accepted her. He spoke gently to her, assuring her that her sins were forgiven (v. 48).

Jesus loves imperfect, wakeari people—which includes you and me. And the greatest demonstration of His love for us is that "while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8). As recipients of His love, may we be conduits of His love to the flawed people around us so they too may know that they can receive God's love despite their imperfections.

An industrial design graduate from a Singapore university was challenged in a workshop to come up with a novel solution to a common problem using only ordinary objects. She created a vest to protect one's personal space from being invaded while traveling in the crush of crowded public trains and buses. The vest was covered with long, flexible plastic spikes normally used to keep birds and cats away from plants.

Jesus knew what it was like to lose His personal space in the commotion of crowds desperate to see and touch Him. A woman who had suffered from constant bleeding for 12 years and could find no cure touched the fringe of His robe.

Immediately, her bleeding stopped (Luke 8:43-44).

Jesus' question, "Who touched me?" (v. 45) isn't as strange as it sounds. He felt power come out of Him (v. 46). That touch was different from those who merely happened to accidentally touch Him.

While we must admit that we do sometimes wish to keep our personal space and privacy, the only

way we help a world of hurting people is to let them get close enough to be touched by the encouragement, comfort, and grace of Christ in us.

On one occasion, I decided to adjust my in-flight eating to the time zone where I was heading. Instead of eating dinner with the rest of the passengers, I kept watching a movie and tried to fall asleep. The hours of elective fasting were difficult, and the breakfast that came right before we landed left much to be desired. But living "out of sorts" with those around me worked. It jolted my body clock into a new time zone.

Paul knew that if believers in Jesus were to truly reflect Him in their lives, they would need to live out of step with the world around them. They "were once darkness" but now they were to live as "children of light" (Ephesians 5:8). And what might that look like? Paul goes on to fill out the picture: "The fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth" (v. 9).

Sleeping through dinner may have seemed foolish to the people on my flight, but even as it's midnight in the world, as believers, we're called to live like it's morning. This may provoke scorn and opposition, but in Jesus we can "walk in the way of love," following the example of the One who "love[s] us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (v. 2).

Scripture says that believers are children of light. This means that we need to live in the full light of God's presence to thrive (Ps. 89:15). If we try to live in darkness, we will produce nothing but "fruitless deeds" (see Eph. 5:3-4, 11). But if we are

living in the light of Jesus, the Light of the world, we will produce the fruit of His light, which is good, faithful, and true.

One set of guidelines is outlined in <u>Ephesians 5</u>. We are to steer clear of immorality, filthiness, foolish talking, coarse jesting (vv.3-4). And we are to have

no "fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness" nor "speak of those things which are done by them in secret" (vv.11-12).

We need to keep learning what is "acceptable to the Lord" (v.10). And sometimes that means taking the remote and clicking the TV off.

At local high school sporting events, Ted was the largest and loudest cheerleader in the stands.

Before a degenerative condition took its toll on him, he stood six feet six inches tall and weighed 290 pounds. Ted's crowd-stirring chants of "Blue!" (the school's color) and candy-tossing at school events were legendary, earning him the name "Big Blue."

But Ted's reputation in his community wasn't just for cheerleading. Neither was it for the alcohol addiction he experienced as a younger man. No, he will be remembered for his love for God and family, for his generosity and kindness. At a four-hour "home-going service" that celebrated his life, person after person came forward to testify about the vibrant Christlike ways of a man who'd been rescued from darkness by the power of Jesus through the gospel.

In <u>Ephesians 5:8</u>, Paul reminded believers that they "were once darkness" but quickly noted, "but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light."

"Fruitless deeds of darkness" are to be avoided (see vv. 3–4, 11).
